

Field Supervisor Safety Skills – Your Role in Driving This Bus

Brief description

OSHA-30 is great, but it covers OSHA & not so much the day-to-day safety responsibilities that your site supervisors have. This course fills that gap and will help them transition from SAFETY TRAINED to SAFETY PREPARED.

Lead persons, foremen, & superintendents have many responsibilities... only ONE of which is safety. But it is an important slice of a large pie.

You likely have many safety processes in place that are designed to achieve desired results – injury prevention, loss reduction, and regulatory compliance. Field supervisors play a central role in how well all of this works.

It makes sense to provide these folks with the tools and training that will empower them to achieve success and have a positive influence in the lives of their crew. Hope to see them here!

- Why their position as a site supervisor is key to the success of safety initiatives
- What critical activities/exposures require planning & what needs to be considered
- Skills necessary to fulfill assigned safety duties (reports, JSAs, OSHA, etc.)
- Skills necessary to turn talks & huddles into opportunities
- Skills that help motivate positive self-directed behavior
